LIBRARY OVERVIEW

- The library operates one facility
- Two outreach vehicles
- Three technology access points
- One remote material return/holds pickup location
- 10 divisions with 60 full-time and 22 part-time staff
- Open to the public 7 days/week
- \$7.3 million operating budget. \$602,448 allocation from the County and \$19,100 in miscellaneous income

FY 2023-2024 HIGHLIGHTS

- Library:
- 303,396 print items checked out (+6%)
- 59,165 non-print items checked out (-11%)
- 211,524 digital items checked out (+13.5%)
- 469,893 print materials owned (-.2%)
- 169,442 library card holders (-.3%)
- 208,212 library visits (+12.2%)
- 254 public uses of meeting space (+37.3)





FY 2023-2024 HIGHLIGHTS:

- Library and Museum:
- 223,864 in person visits (13% increase)
- 3,774 programs (25% increase)
- 104,912 attending programs (32% increase)
- 276,570 accessed Museum & Library online resources (40% increase)





CURRENT PRIORITIES

- Completing the library entrance enhancements and Sensory Garden
- Getting the new outreach vehicle on the road and providing services
- When feasible, addressing recommendations of last year's space needs assessment grant-funded project
- Working with Mental Health Associates of the Triad and library staff to begin the new initiative providing social services to library customers
- Standardizing Farmers Market operations to manage growth, maintain focus on core values, and ensure its continued success
- Completing HVAC and roof replacement project at Museum
