PURPOSE:

Presentation on costs associated with the installation of a new traffic signal at the intersection of Hillcrest Place and N. Main Street (Brown Truck Brewery).

BACKGROUND:

The City of High Point has contracted with Kimley Horn and Associates to study N. Main Street from Lexington Avenue to Church Street to provide recommendations for pedestrian safety improvements, streetscape improvements, speed reduction strategies, and complete street concepts. The study will be completed in late 2023. At the May 3rd Prosperity and Livability Committee Meeting, staff gave a presentation on possible interim safety treatments that could be installed in the location of the current crosswalk at Brown Truck Brewery until the more comprehensive study is complete. One of the identified potential future considerations discussed was a full traffic signal at the Hillcrest Place / N. Main Street intersection. The Committee requested more detail on the cost associated with the installation of a new traffic signal at Hillcrest Place.


RECOMMENDATION / ACTION REQUESTED:

Direction from Committee on how to proceed.

Summary from the May 3, 2023, Prosperity and Livability Committee Meeting

- Kimley Horn and Associates provided a list of potential interim improvements.
- Staff recommended to the Committee which treatments we felt were the best options based on cost and constructability.
- Evaluate feasibility of additional alternatives as part of greater Main Street Corridor Study.



 Committee requested we investigate possible installation of either a High Intensity Activated CrossWalk (HAWK) or a full signalized intersection.


Hillcrest Court / N. Main Street HAWK Signal

- HAWK Signal will not be approved by NCDOT
 - Too close to Hillcrest Place intersection
 - Hillcrest Place right turning traffic/pedestrian conflicts
 - Hillcrest Place would need to be closed



Hillcrest Court / N. Main Street Signal

- New signal must be approved by NCDOT
- Require modification/removal of the Brown Truck driveways.
- The intersection would need to be milled and repaved.
- Estimated completion is 9-10 months if started today. The Main Street Study will be completed about the same time

The current estimate for this work would be approximately \$261,000. If outside engineering, and an outside contractor is needed to construct the signal the cost could be approximately \$430,000.




NORTH CAROLINA'S INTERNATIONAL

Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) Program Background

The city set a goal to modernize its utility information system capabilities and services which include:

An AMI system to modernize the way we read **electric** and **water meters**

A CEP (customer engagement portal) system to provide our customer user community with "self service" abilities



A MDM (meter data management) system to fully harness the data from the AMI system

The **integration** of these new systems with our **legacy information systems**



Accomplishments to Date





Request for Proposal (RFP's) were developed, published, and processed in Q2 of 2021





The city secured a contract for the AMI system in Q1 of 2022





Strategic planning, business design, solution architecture, and Organization Change Management (OCM) activities have begun





RFP responses were received, scored, and a selection was made for the Meter Data Management (MDM) and Customer Engagement Portal (CEP)




Work in Progress

Contract development and negotiations are well underway for the MDM and CEP systems

> A small number of electric and water AMI meters have been installed for test purposes

Business process and solution architecture designs are being developed as we begin to engage the new technology providers

Overall AMI Modernization Program Plan

All contract negotiations and execution will be completed by the end of Q2 / 2023

A limited initial deployment of the AMI system will begin in Q3 2023 and is expected to last 1-3 months.

City wide AMI deployment will begin in Q3 of 2024 and is expected to last 18-24 months.




Initial Deployment Area (IDA)

The plan for the **IDA** is to install approximately 400 electric meters and 500 water meters in a focused area


The IDA is expected to take 10 to 12 months





City of High Point Panhandling Update



PANHANDLING

Applicable Statues or Ordinances

• G.S. 20-175(B):

No person shall stand or loiter in the main traveled portion, including the shoulders and median, of any State highway or street, excluding sidewalks, or stop any motor vehicle for the purpose of soliciting employment, business contributions from the driver or occupant of any motor vehicle **that impedes the normal movement of traffic** on the public highways or streets.



PANHANDLING

Applicable Statues and Ordinances

- C.O. 10-1-138: Pedestrians Soliciting Rides, Business or Contributions
- (a) No person shall <u>stand</u>, <u>sit or walk in a roadway</u> for the purpose of soliciting a ride, employment, business or contributions from the occupant of any vehicle traveling in or upon a roadway or stopped momentarily in compliance with duly erected traffic control device or traffic sign located upon the highway.
- C.O. 12-1-13: Aggressive Solicitation Prohibited
- ➤ Aggressive solicitation includes approaching or following pedestrians, repetitive soliciting despite refusals, the use of abusive or profane language to cause fear and intimidation, unwanted physical contact, or the intentional blocking of pedestrian and vehicular traffic.
- ➤ Locations noted: at or near banks, automated teller machines, public transportation facilities, and crosswalks
- ➤ Intended to protect citizens from the fear and intimidation accompanying certain kinds of solicitations, and not to limit constitutionally protected activity.

Sec 18-44: Blocking or Impeding Street and Sidewalk Access



Highlights

Traffic Island / Median Noted

• "Impede" Defined

Permittees Allowed



CHARGING and REALITY

- All lower-level misdemeanors or infractions.
- Almost every violation will require an officer to observe the violation taking place to establish probable cause (PC). A citizen calling in will not be enough to establish the necessary PC.
- Cite and release. Very few, if any, custody arrests.
- District Attorney priority??

RESOURCES

Resources for panhandlers are the same as those for homeless individuals/families or those at risk of homelessness:

Continuum of Care System (CoC) – Coordinated Entry (CE) System is the point of entry to receive services through CoC agencies (24/7 hotline)

- Housing (case management) Emergency, transitional, rapid rehousing (RRH), permanent supportive housing (PSH); HPHA and other affordable housing providers
- Services (case management) Health/mental health, transportation, education (GCS)/GED, food insecurity, etc.; High Point Library (Community Café)
- Job skills (case management) GTCC, construction training programs, Welfare Reform Liaison Project (WRLP)
