PURPOSE:

A request by Yalik's African American Art & Cultural Movement in partnership with the Washington Street Historical Preservation Society, DRIVE High Point Foundation, and Visit High Point for approval of a historic marker to recognize Greenhill Cemetery to be located on the south side of the cemetery, 350 feet from the corner of Meredith Street and R.C. Baldwin Avenue.

BACKGROUND:

The Historic Preservation Commission is designated by the Historic Marker Policy to review and evaluate all proposed roadside historic markers prior to consideration by City Council. This roadside historic marker request is the tenth request under the City's roadside Historic Marker Policy.

BUDGET IMPACT:

Yalik's African American Art and Cultural Movement is purchasing this marker.

RECOMMENDATION / ACTION REQUESTED:

A. Staff Recommendation

Staff recommended approval of this request as outlined in the attached staff report.

B. At its November 10, 2021 meeting, the Historic Preservation Commission reviewed a request for a historic marker recognizing Greenhill Cemetery. Six members of the Commission were present. Mr. David Fencl, Senior Planner, presented the request and recommended approval of the request as outlined in the staff report.

The Historic Preservation Commission determined that the proposed marker met the minimum evaluation criteria of the Historic Marker Policy, which includes the site's significance occurred at least 50 years before the request, no other public or private markers

recognize Greenhill Cemetery, and the location of the proposed marker is within the corporate limits. The Historic Preservation Commission also determined that the proposed marker will be consistent in appearance with several existing City markers and recommended approval of the historic marker request, as recommended by staff, by a vote of 6-0.

PURPOSE:

The Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) is designated by the Historic Marker Policy to review all requests for historic markers to be located in public street rights-of-way. The HPC shall first determine whether the request meets the minimum evaluation criteria outlined in the policy, and if the request meets the minimum evaluation criteria, the HPC shall then evaluate the request based on relevant criteria as determined by the HPC.

The following criteria must be present and factually correct in order for the HPC to review any request for placement of a marker:

- 1. Any site or event requested to be recognized must be at least 50 years old and for any individual to be recognized with a marker, the individual's contribution that is the subject of the request must have occurred as least 50 years before the request.
- 2. There may not be any current markers, public or private, currently recognizing the site or event within the City of High Point.
- 3. The location requested to be recognized must be within the corporate limits of the City of High Point and within public view.

Requests for markers shall be evaluated based on relevant criteria as determined by the HPC, including the following:

- Is each historical claim by the applicant presenting the request supported by
 documentation or other evidence of the claim's validity? Documentation should
 consist of primary sources that were created at the time of the event and may include
 tax records, deeds, newspaper articles, meeting minutes, photographs, etc. Secondary
 sources may be submitted to help provide context and justify the significance of the
 event, person, or location.
- 2. In an attempt to avoid repetition and promote diversity in the recognitions, is the requested site, event or individual closely related to a site, event or individual accomplishment that has already been recognized with a Marker?

- 3. Has the site, event, or individual contribution maintained its significance over time?
- 4. Is the site, event or individual recognized outside of High Point at state wide, national, or international levels?
- 5. Marker proposals will be rejected if the Commission cannot authenticate or verify the historical information to its satisfaction. The Commission shall make the deciding rule if there is conflicting evidence.

STAFF ANALYSIS:

According to the information supplied with this Historic Marker Request, the city purchased 6 acres of property for \$750 on the east side of the city to establish a cemetery for African American residents in January 1910. The first burial in what is now called Greenhill Cemetery took place in August 1910. Prior to the establishment of Greenhill Cemetery, African Americans had been buried in Oakwood Cemetery. Greenhill Cemetery now covers eleven acres and consists of 1250 burial plots.

Greenhill Cemetery is the final resting place for many prominent African American families, educators, politicians, preachers, doctors, and lawyers. Among those buried at Greenhill includes Willis R. Hinton, who was born into slavery and eventually owned and operated the Hinton Hotel on Washington Street; Alfred J. Griffin, Principal of High Point Normal and Industrial School from 1897-1923 and William Penn High School from 1923-1930; Reverend William Blair, presiding elder of St. Stephens A.M.E. Zion Church and John Coltrane's grandfather; John and Nannie Kilby, business pioneers and owners of the Kilby Hotel; Dr. Garland Alfonso Gerran, who was High Point's first black doctor to set up practice in the 1890s; and E.E. Curtwright, who became Principal of William Penn High School following A.J. Griffin and had joined the staff in 1902.


Staff believes that this historic marker request meets the minimum evaluation criteria due to Greenhill Cemetery being established more than 50 years ago, there are no other historic markers recognizing Greenhill Cemetery and the marker's proposed location is within the City of High Point and within public view. The applicant has submitted copies of primary resources, such as a 1910 High Point Enterprise article and City Council minutes documenting the purchase and payment for the cemetery property, a newspaper article documenting the first burial in the cemetery and city plans documenting cemetery plots dated 1952 and 1959.

RECOMMENDATION / ACTION REQUESTED:

Staff recommends the Historic Preservation Commission recommend approval of the historic marker request for Greenhill Cemetery. This historic marker request meets the minimum evaluation criteria, and with the documentation submitted with this request, staff believes this request meets the relevant evaluation criteria of the Historic Marker Policy.




City of High Point Historic Marker Request



Greenhill Cemetery 1700 Leonard Street High Point, NC



Commissioner E.A. Younts purchased six acres of the Burns property beyond the old Burns house fronting on Leonard St. in the eastern section of the city for a colored cemetery. Mr. Younts was authorized by the board some time ago to select a location for this purpose and yesterday closed a deal with Mr. J.A. Campbell for six acres.

City Council Mins

Regular meeting of the Board of Council of the City of High Point was held in the Mayors office February 14th, 1910, at 2:30 P.M.

Fred N. Tate, Mayor, preciding.

Councilmen prosent: S. H. Hilliard, J. H. Vestal, H. A. Hillis, E. A. Younts, J. T. Burrus, J. W. Sechrest, Thiers Leach and Dr. Peacock.

Winutes of last meeting were read and approved.

Upon motion of Dr. Peacock seconded by E.A. Younts,
it was ordered that poll tax for 1907 be refunded to

W. I. Montgomery. Upon motion of Dr. Peacock seconded by J. T. Burrus, the Mayor and Auditor were authorized to execute note for \$750. payable to the High Point Savings & Trust Company, placing deed in escro to secure money to pay for cemetery purchased on Leonard Street. It was further ordered that all money paid to the City as lots are sold, be credited on this note.

Upon motion of H. A. Millis seconded by Dr. Peacock, the ordinance in regard to the obstruction of streets and sidewalks passed its second reading.

Councilmen Peaceck, Leach, Burrus, Sechrest, Younts, Millis, Vestal and Hilliard all voting aye.

Upon notion of Thiers Leach seconded by E. A.

Younts, amendment to Section 52 City ordinances in regard to condemned meats passed its second reading. Councilmen

Pescock, Leach, Burrus, Sechrest, Younts, Millis, Vestal and Hilliard all voting aye.

Upon motion of Dr. Burrus seconded by J.W.Scchrest a committee composed of H. A. Millis, E.A. Younts, J. W. Sechrest, Fred N. Tate, Mayor, with authority to act, was appointed to confer with the manager of the High Point Hoisery MILLS in regard to sewer rentals.

Upon motion, meeting adjourned,

February 14, 1910 – City Council Minutes. Upon motion of Dr. Peacock, second by J.T. Burrus, the Mayor and Auditor, we authorized to execute note for &750.00, payable to the High Point Savings & Trust Co., placing deed in escrow to secure money to pay for cemetery purchased on Leonard St. it was further ordered that all money paid to the city as lots are sold, be credited on this note.


FIRST BURIAL IN THE COLORED CEMETERY

The first burial in the colored emetery took place yesterday he burial ground for colored peo ple heretofore was alongside the white cemetery, but at a meeting of the City Council, sometime ago they ordered the purchase of a burial ground for colored people Councilman Younts purchsaed a piece of ground in the eastern part of the city, in the Burns property. Mr. Sechrest is busy today laying off the lots. Those that are not sold will be sodded with bermuda grass.



Greenhill Cemetery is rich in history, housing prominent individuals, families and war veterans.

Willis R. Hinton was born into slavery around 1838 in Wake County, he arrived in High Point after slavery ended. Hinton owned and operated a restaurant on S. Main St., which he sold. He then opened an 11-room hotel at 607 E. Washington St., that he called the Hinton Hotel. It was High Point's




Alfred J. Griffin, Principle of High Point Normal and industrial School, 1897-1923, later William Penn High School, 1923-1930. Several of his family members are buried at Greenhill



Buried at the cemetery is Rev. William Blair, Presiding elder of St. Stephens A.M.E. Zion Church on Leonard Avenue and John Coltrane's grandfather.




John and Nannie Kilby, Business pioneers and owners of the Kilby Hotel



Dr. Garland Alfonso Gerran was High Point's first black doctor to set up practice here in the 1890s. Gerran graduated from Shaw University's Leonard School of Medicine in Raleigh. His office was at 603 E. Washington St. and he lived 707 E. Washington St. with his wife Marie.



E..E. Curtwright joined the staff of William Penn High School in 1902 and was the principal following A.J. Griffin.




The cemetery now situated on approximately 11 acres of land owned by the City of High Point and consists of 1250 burial plots.




Goals for Greenhill Cemetery

- Replace fencing
- Lighting of cemetery
- Upgrade landscaping
- Improve signage inside cemetery and direction signage around the community
- Improve monuments conditions, settings and grounds
- Plan and prioritize future capital projects and improvements such as acquiring properties at corner of Leonard Ave. and Woodbury for future expansion.





The historical marker for Greenhill Cemetery will be placed on the southside of the cemetery, 350 ft from the corner of Meredith St and R.C. Baldwin Ave. The location is within the corporate limits of the City of High Point and the site will be within public view. Location of the maker has been approved by Cemetery Parks Supervisor, Brad Embry.



Verbiage for Marker

Green Hill Cemetery was established in 1910 for \$750 when the city of High Point purchased 6 acres of land for burial of its colored citizens. Today the cemetery is situated on approximately 11 acres of land and consists of 1250 burial plots. Rich in history, Greenhill Cemetery is the final resting place for many prominent African American families, educators, politicians, preachers, doctors, lawyers. Among those laid to rest are 210 veterans who served in WWI, WWII, Korean War, and the Vietnam War.
