PURPOSE:

The Community Development and Housing Department (CD&H) has completed necessary activities for preparation and submission of the 2015-16 Annual Action Plan and the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan to the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). BACKGROUND:

HUD awards grants to eligible community grantees to carry out a wide range of community development activities directed toward revitalizing neighborhoods, affordable housing, economic development, and providing improved community facilities and services. High Point is required to submit a five year consolidated plan to HUD in order to receive Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) funds.

BUDGET IMPACT:

The city will receive a CDBG allocation in the amount of \$808,831 (a decrease of \$1,068 from last year) and HOME allocation of \$320,099 (a decrease of \$35,901 from last year). Additionally, program income is expected in the amounts of \$135,000 for CDBG and \$458,000 for HOME.

RECOMMENDATION / ACTION REQUESTED:

The action plan process has met HUD citizen participation requirements for plan development such as public availability of the proposed Plan, public hearings on the Plan, and the public comment period. We ask that Council favorably consider approval of the 2015-16 Annual Action Plan and the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and authorize the City Manager to execute necessary documents for submission to HUD. The plan must be submitted to HUD no later than May 15, 2015.

2015-2019 Consolidated Plan and 2015-2016 Annual Action Plan: Executive Summary

The City of High Point's Community Development and Housing Department, along with WFN Consulting, Inc., has prepared its draft 2015-2019 Five-Year Consolidated Plan and 2015-2016 Annual Action Plan, as required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The Consolidated Plan identifies priority community development and housing needs for the City, with an emphasis on low and moderate income and special-needs populations. The Annual Action Plan outlines how High Point plans to spend its Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME) funds over the

next fiscal year.

Citizen Participation

- Interview and focus group participation from 21 organizations
- Interview and public meeting participation from 52 residents

Needs Assessment

The Needs Assessment considered housing needs, public housing, homeless and other special needs populations, and non-housing community development needs. Key findings include:

- Affordability is the most common housing problem. Two-thirds (67%) of households with incomes under 80% of the Area Median Income (AMI) have a cost burden (i.e., spend over 30% of their income on housing).
- Cost burdened households are more likely to be renters. Low and moderate income cost burdened renters outnumber cost burdened owners by nearly two to one (6,919 renter households versus 3,667 owner households).
- There is existing demand for additional subsidized housing units. The City of High Point Housing Authority administers 1,132 public housing units (with a wait list of 634 households) and 1,484 housing choice vouchers (with a wait list of 967 households).
- * There were 897 homeless persons in Guilford County as of the 2014 point in time count. An estimated 89% of homeless persons were sheltered and 11% were unsheltered. Twelve percent (12%) reported being chronically homeless. Homeless service providers identified a day center as a top need.
- Other special needs populations in High Point include elderly and disabled residents (who make up 6.3% and 13.3% of High Point population, respectively), and victims of domestic violence.

Community development needs identified through public input include: youth and senior services, transportation assistance, employment services, health/mental health services, services for the limited English proficiency population, parks/recreation facilities, street and sidewalk improvements, and rehab or demolition of blighted properties.

Housing Market Analysis

The Housing Market Analysis characterized the existing supply of housing in High Point, along with subsidized housing, homeless and special needs facilities and services, and non-housing community development assets. Major findings include:

- Over half of High Point's rental housing and 43% of its owned housing was built before 1980. Older units may be at increased risk of falling into poor condition due to age. Units built before 1978 with children present (2,247 owned units and 1,670 rental units) are at elevated risk of lead-based paint hazards.
- * Homeless facilities in High Point offer 229 beds for its homeless population. The majority of these are emergency shelter beds (68%). There are 47 units dedicated to providing permanent supportive housing, and homeless housing providers indicate permanent supportive housing as a key need in the City.
- * Manufacturing and Education and Health Services are the top employment sectors in High Point, each making up 18% of jobs. Stakeholder input indicates that recent technological advances in the manufacturing field require advanced technical training and/or an associate's degree, potentially leading to the displacement of existing workers who lack these skills.
- ❖ A statewide Skills Gap Analysis identified the need for employment skills training in the following areas: attendance, communication, customer service, problem solving, writing, critical and analytical thinking, following directions, and teamwork.

2015-2019 Consolidated Plan Priorities

The City of High Point identified the following priority needs based on community input, rate of cost burdening, age of housing, other findings from the needs assessment and market analysis, and findings from prior research and plans, including the City's Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice, the Core City Master Plan, and Guilford County's 10-Year Strategy to End Homelessness.
