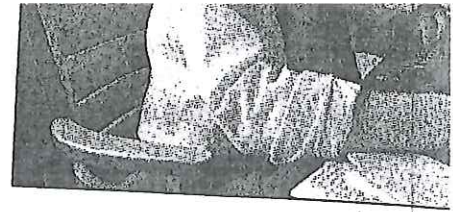

Article #2 Police: Problems at drug rehab houses are minimal

HIGH POINT — Does a program that houses rehabilitating drug addicts draw more crime in the areas where the homes are located?

Statistics from the High Point Police Department obtained by The High Point Enterprise show that calls to existing houses that are part of the program are infrequent and usually deal with minor law enforcement issues.

Caring Services, a nonprofit that provides housing and drug-and-alcohol-addiction treatment services, is looking to move from its current location on Chestnut Drive to the John Wesley University campus.

A group of about 30 residents who live near the campus turned out to a High Point Planning and Zoning Commission meeting last week opposing the project, expressing worries about a potential increase in crime their neighborhoods.

According to data from the High Point Police Department, there were 57 calls for service to the 11 Caring Services properties between April 9, 2017, and April 10, 2018, a number that Police Chief Kenneth Shultz called "minimal" and "typical of other residential areas in the city."

Of the 57 calls, a majority were for police officers to make an arrest of an individual in one of Caring Services' 11 houses. Other calls included reports of larceny and public disturbance.
