Zoning Map Amendment Application - 435 N. Wrenn Street

To initiate a zoning map amendment for an approximate 0.25 acres lying along the west side of N. Wrenn Street, approximately 80 feet south of W. Westwood Avenue (435 N. Wrenn Street), from the Mixed Use - Downtown (MX-D) District to the Central Business (CB) District.

Heidi Galanti, Planning Services Administrator with the Planning and Development Department introduced the item. She spoke to the purpose of the MX-D District was to create a cohesive downtown area that encouraged the desired development style and mix of uses typical in traditional downtown areas, and that the MX-D District does not allow the establishment of new Market Showrooms and that the property was previously used as a Market Showroom and was vacant at that time of the zoning change in 2017. Ms. Galanti stated the request would go to the Planning and Zoning Commission in June and would come before the City Council at the second meeting in July.

Council Member Williams asked was this request just an initiation. Ms. Galanti responded yes it was just an initiation. She stated the owner was given a notice before the rezoning, that it was vacant for about a year before the rezoning; the property owner lives in Colorado; and that either the owner or a representative would be here in June or July.

Mayor Pro-Tem Ewing spoke in opposition to the request and stated without the creation of the Mixed Use- Downtown (MX-D) District there would not be economic progress for the downtown redevelopment area. The Plan was put into place to encourage downtown redevelopment.

Council Member Golden concurred, and stated the owner had an opportunity to protest when a notice was given to him before the rezoning. Council Member Williams concurred with Mayor Pro-Tem Ewing and Council Member Golden.

Council Member Moore asked staff what the request was based on. Ms. Galanti stated that the property was a very small parcel that fronts on Wrenn Street with no frontage on N. Main Street which creates a unique situation.

A motion was made by Mayor Pro Tem Ewing, seconded by Council Member Williams, that the Zoning Map Amendment Application be denied. The motion for denial carried by the following 5-4 vote:

Zoning Map Amendment Application - N. Main Corridor

To initiate zoning map amendments for 52 parcels (approximately 58 acres) in blocks along and adjacent to the N. Main Street corridor, between Westchester/Eastchester Drive northward to I-74/Old Plank Road, as part of the Comprehensive Zoning Map Amendment project.

Herb Shannon, Senior Planner with the Planning and Development Department spoke to The Comprehensive Zoning Map Amendment project as being a multi-year undertaking that began in 2017 following the adoption of the new Development Ordinance, stated the first group of properties rezoned under this project was approved by the City Council in September of 2018; the next group of properties is located along or near the N. Main Street corridor between Westchester/Eastchester Drive north to I-74/Old Plank Road, that were last zoned in the 1980s and 1990s. Mr. Shannon spoke to many of the identified properties have zoning conditions that have been met or are no longer valid; to the proposed districts allow all the existing uses of land on the parcels; to the group including 52 parcels totaling approximately 58 acres; and stated the amendments will be brought to public hearing in phases in the next six months.

A motion was made by Council Member Williams, seconded by Council Member Moore, to initiate zoning map amendments for these 52 parcels

(approximately 58 acres) in blocks along and adjacent to the N. Main Street corridor, between Westchester/Eastchester Drive northward to I-74/Old Plank Road, as part of the Comprehensive Zoning Map Amendment project. The motion carried by the following unanimous 9-0 vote:

2019-222 <u>Ordinance - Zoning Map Amendment 19-04-Piedmont International</u> University

Monday, May 20, 2019 at 5:30 p.m. is the date and time established to receive public comment on a request by Piedmont International University to rezone approximately 20.7 acres from a Conditional Zoning Institutional (CZ I) District to the Office Institutional (OI) District and the Single Family Residential-3 (R-3) District. The site lies approximately 900 feet north of the intersection of Eastchester Drive and N. Centennial Street, between Eastchester Drive and N. Centennial Street, and south of Countryside Drive.

Herb Shannon, Senior Planner with the Planning and Development Department stated the property was used historically for the John Wesley college; the owner wanted to sell property; and that homes on centennial street would be sub divided and sold as individual parcels because the property was longer considered a campus style setting. Mr. Shannon said there was a new buyer that wanted to purchase 15 acres to form classrooms in the building for the church.

Council Member Scarborough asked if the building would continue to be used by the church. Mr. Shannon replied yes for activities, worship service, and a place to house guest speakers.

Following the presentation of the staff report, Chairman Williams opened the public hearing and asked if there were any comments. There being none, the public hearing was closed.

Adopted an Ordinance approving Zoning Map Amendment 19-04 to rezone approximately 20.7 acres from a Conditional Zoning Institutional (CZ-I) District to the Office Institutional (OI) District and the Single Family Residential-3 (R-3) District based on consistency with the Land Use Map designations and the Eastchester Corridor Plan and that the requested OI zoning district serves as a

transition between more intense business zoning to the east and south, and residential zoning to the north and west; and that the request is reasonable and in the public interest because the requested zoning districts are consistent with the surrounding zoning pattern and, as applied, are compatible with the adjacent residential area.
